make and shape our objects and so little to destroy them. It took hundreds of years for some trees to grow, but with a sharp chain saw we can cut them down in no time - and we do it. On TV I see the city of Baghdad being bombed. It has taken a long time to build it. Like other cities it has architectural masterpieces, works of art. Artists and artisans alike devote much of their talents to show their national pride in the structures they build. The capital city always displays in its buildings the rich history of a nation. All this can be demolished with a couple of bunker busters, leaving a pile of rubble. Destroying is so much easier than building.

This is true also in relationships between people. Building a beautiful relationship with another person takes time and effort. It is built brick by brick and cemented together by trowel after trowel of love: Windows put in to look in and out of each other's heart, doors hung to enter into each other's innermost self, decorated with the sign "Welcome". We are created to have such relationships with spouses, children and friends and it is a delight to see these bonds flourishing. They are monuments of our civilization and should be cherished. Yet, just as one misdirected missile or one stray bomb can demolish architectural masterpieces one cruel word can undo years of friendship. One greedy deed can cause the loss of a friend's trust. There are even occasions where our words are laser accurate to be hurtful and destructive. We see the ruins of such broken relationships all around us. We have all felt at one time or another such destruction. Words have been more effective as weapons of mass destruction than any anthrax powder ever will be.

At the same time words have been the most effective and efficient way to bring about healing, comfort, peace, hope and love.

Consider these words from the apostle Paul in the Scriptures: Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It is not rude, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil, but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres.

Landscaping

We will have the underground sprinkler system activated soon and this will help us to better maintain our lawns. We have scheduled a meeting with a landscaping firm to review repairs to some of the damage that occurred to the landscaping last summer.

I commend the volunteers of the Garden Interest Committee and others who have taken an active interest in maintaining the lawns and other landscaping.

Construction update

Construction continues on phases 3 and 4. The contractor hopes to start roofing on phase 3 very soon, and much of the concrete work has now been completed on phase 4. Work continues on the underground parking garage.

Naming the new buildings

We continue to refer to the new buildings as phase 3 and phase 4, but the time has come to suggest names for these buildings. If you have suggestions, please leave them with Heather in the office. Hurst Drive extension

The City of Barrie has let us know us that construction of Hurst Drive will begin in June with completion by October-November. This will mean that the existing construction road located south of Bethany Gables will only be available for construction traffic and emergency vehicles. All residents will then be required to use the entrance adjacent to garden home No.1.

Window cleaning

We have made arrangements with Steve's Maintenance to clean exterior windows. They will clean the exterior windows of the garden homes and the exterior windows of all three floors of the apartment buildings with the exception of those windows accessible from your patio or balcony. It is anticipated that he will start on Tuesday, May 20.

Because of the type of window, the cleaner will require access to your apartment to do this. Tenants are requested to remove all items from the windowsills and to make sure the windows are easily accessible. A reminder notice will be sent out at the time the work is done. If you wish Steve's Maintenance to do any other window cleaning in your unit please make arrangements directly with them when they are in your unit.

Mike and I rene's story

By Mike and Elaine Cassidy, with the editor ike and Irene Cassidy were both born in Seaforth, a suburb of Liverpool, England, Mike in 1934 and Irene in 1935. Here the famous Gladstone dock was located, the world's largest dry dock named after a famous British prime minister.

During the Second World War young Mike saw much destruction and death, some of which is still etched in his memory. His family lost their belongings twice to bombings and enemy bombs also killed some of his friends who were trying to find shelter.

When he was fifteen Mike joined the British Merchant Navy, where he served for twelve years sailing all over the world as an able seaman and later as a chief petty officer.

Although he was not a Christian when he met his future wife Mike believes that God sent an angel when he met Irene. How they met is quite a story. Irene was one of four siblings. Her father and two of her three brothers were in the navy. Her parents sent her to Wales, wanting to protect her from the bombings Liverpool, a main shipping area, often sustained. She stayed there the next four and a half years and it was a dramatic time in her life as she was separated from her family and not allowed to go back home.

Irene began playing the piano in the parlor of the house where she was staying and she has been playing ever since. She now knows that this is a gift from God.

> At age eighteen Irene met Mike in a nightclub where she was playing piano and he was singing. It was not love at

first sight – they courted for five years – but in 1959 they got married.

In 1963 they immigrated to Canada, arriving with \$300.00 in their pocket. Settling in Weston, then a suburb of Toronto, they were both working in a few days, Irene at a bank and Mike with the department of highways. Mike later found employment with Canadian National Railways in law enforcement and later joined the metropolitan Toronto police force.

Their first child, Michelle, was born in 1965, and their second daughter, Shauna, in 1970, a miracle in itself, as they had been told in England that they could not have any children. Irene and Mike both came from non-Christian homes, but in 1973 they committed their lives to God. God changed their whole lives for the better and put their marriage back on track. With Mike in the police force there had been a lot of stress and temptation and it had almost ruined their marriage.

Now they are involved in a ministry called Fellowship of Christian Peace Officers, an organization that reaches out to police officers and their wives and families who are going through turmoil in their lives. They present them with the gospel of Christ by having police appreciation services and setting up chapters where they can meet, have Bible studies and fellowship with their families and fellow police officers.

Not only locally, but Mike and Irene travel Ontario and the Unites States during the summertime doing this work as well and they feel privileged to be used by God in this way. George's "Food For All" Walk

n May 6 George Zondervan made an important purchase – a pair of waterproof boot covers that he will need to wear over his walking shoes during the next few wet days in Alberta. We know this from a report Nicolette Langhout sent to her parents, Cor and Lieske Langhout, the Zondervan neighbours in Tollendale Village.

Many of us have probably been wondering how George and Betty are doing on their planned eightmonth trek across Canada to raise funds for the Canadian Foodgrains Bank. In front of me I have several pages of George's journal that have been downloaded from the website. Space does not permit me to tell you all the interesting and exiting things that have been happening and all George's musings as he reflects on his daily walk. Cor Langhout has been faithfully posting news on a bulletin board. Now a special board has been put up in the basement of Eden Hall opposite the mail slots.

Nicolette, who now lives in Edmonton, met the Zondervans and provided a warm touch from home – hugs, flowers and probably news. (About the building going up a few feet from their porch?)

George's walk has been going well. Hundreds of kilometers have been covered. It began officially,

with coverage by newspapers, radio and television, on March 29 in Stanley Park, Vancouver and a prayerful send-off. The minister who officiated quoted Ecclesiastes 1:1 "Cast your bread upon the waters for after many days you will find it again". Betty and George actually cast bread upon the water and expect that it will be returned to them in the form of many donations to feed the hungry of the world. They have enjoyed both spectacular scenery and warm welcomes including bed-andbreakfasts by members of supporting churches of several denominations. Because of the media coverage passing motorists often acknowledge them by honking horns or even stopping to donate money. This always lifts George's spirits. They also visited schools and interacted with hundreds of students. There was a visit to the Alberta Legislature where MLAs acknowledged George and Betty with traditional desk-thumping. At an auction in Ponoka, Alberta, a steer, donated by a local rancher, was sold seven times with all proceeds going to the Food For All Walk. After summer-like temperatures they have now experienced the freezing weather and the snow we have been hearing about this past week. Hence the boot covers!

Another thing happened. Betty had a fall on May 4, not on the road, but at a friend's home. She broke her left arm in several places and needed surgery. "But", writes Nicolette, "Betty, with her arm in a cast, was cheerful and looked very good. The latest plan is that George will begin his walk south to Calgary on Wednesday, May 7, with Jack [a friend and walk coordinator] doing the driving. Betty is planning to meet up with her husband in Calgary this weekend. To some it may seem like a huge task for Betty to drive the van with her left arm in a cast. However, believe me when she says that I am convinced that she will do just fine. The determination in both George's and Betty's eyes and the smiles on their faces is a clear indication that they will be together on the road again real soon."



The message was loud and clear: Leave the park the way it is. There will be a parking lot at what will be the new intersection of Hurst and Tollendal Mill Road. It will accommodate up to 35 cars and that should be sufficient. The plan will go to another advisory board and then to city council.

There was an opportunity to sign up for a program called "Adopt a Park". We can become involved in keeping the park clean and secure. I am sure that several of us would be interested in joining this program. We will keep you informed.
